Each of the seven districts will qualify its district champion to the regional/state bracket, with the remaining nine teams to be determined by RPI. The 16-team field will be seeded by the following criteria:

2A Seeding Criteria

Each of the seven districts will qualify its district champion to the regional/state bracket. The 16-team bracket will be seeded under the following criteria: The teams will initially be ranked by RPI, avoiding any first-round match-ups with district opponents. Whenever possible, no teams from the same district shall be placed in the same quadrant. If a district champion and the runner-up from the same district are ranked in the top 8 by RPI, one shall be placed in the top of the bracket and the other in the bottom of the bracket.

The CHSAA liaison will determine regional sites and set game times. The regional winners will advance to the semifinal and final games on Saturday, May 25, 2019.

2A District Information

District Assignments: Schools may elect to compete in a full schedule within their district to determine their seeds for the district tournament play or to establish some other method. This must be determined before the season begins and reported to the CHSAA by March 15.

Also, multi-league districts must decide their tournament seeding procedures prior to the beginning of the season. There is no protection of league champions in a multi-league district.

NOTE: Schools listed that are not planning on fielding a team should contact the CHSAA office immediately.

Districts must be completed by the second Saturday in May.

2. Regional and state sites to be determined by the CHSAA.

SEEDING PROCESS – CLASS 3A, 4A, 5A

After determining the qualifiers to the state bracket through the automatic seeds and RPI rankings, each 3A, 4A, and 5A bracket shall be seeded by a committee appointed by the CHSAA Assistant Commissioner responsible for baseball on a bracket featuring four quadrants. The committee may use the following in determining the bracket:

- RPI Final Rankings
- League Standing
- Head to Head in Non-League Games
- Strength of League
- Geography (lowest 8 seeded teams may be adjusted to improve the overall geography of the bracket)

Note on quadrant placement as it refers to League Standing: Designations (1, 2, etc.) from a league are significant in the seeding process in that a team may not be seeded above a team from its own league that has a better designation within a quadrant (e.g., D4 may not be seeded above D3, but, C3 may be seeded above CSM2 within a quadrant). But D4 could be a #4 seed in one region and D3 could be a #5 seed in another quadrant. NOTE: The committee shall, when possible, avoid pairings that will cause teams from the same league to meet in the 1st round.)

1. The top two teams from each district (designated by leagues and excluding the Colorado 7, and Confluence) will automatically qualify for the regional tournaments. If any of the three teams playing in the 3A/4A Colorado 7 win that league, or finish in second place outright, that team(s) would also automatically qualify. The remaining 18 (19, 20) teams will qualify by RPI.
2. The six (7) league champions, plus the next 2 (1) highest ranked team by the final RPI standings will host the regionals. Once those teams have been placed on the bracket, the committee will then place the remaining teams on the bracket utilizing the seeding process outlined in "Seeding Process – Class 3A, 4A, 5A" (page 7).
3. The regional tournaments will be single elimination, with the eight regional winners advancing to a double elimination state tournament to be played TBA at predetermined sites. The pairings will follow the seeds established prior to the district tournament.
4. The schedule for the 3A, 4A, 5A double elimination tournaments are on pages 10-12.

2. The 10 league champions, including the 4A/5A Southwestern League, will automatically qualify to the 32-team regional bracket. The remaining teams will be determined by RPI, including Ponderosa and Vista Peak. The eight regional hosts will be determined by RPI ranking among the league champions. Teams 9-32 will be seeded under the process outlined in "Seeding Process – Class 3A, 4A, 5A," found on page 7 in this report.
3. The regional tournaments will be single elimination, with the eight regional winners advancing to a double elimination state tournament to be played TBA at predetermined sites. The pairings will follow the seeds established prior to the district tournament.

1. Thirty-two teams, based on league finish, qualify for eight 4-team regionals to be held on Saturday, May 12 at the site of the highest seeds.
2. The eight league champions will automatically qualify to the 32-team regional bracket. The remaining teams will be determined by RPI. The regional hosts will be the top eight teams as determined by RPI. Teams 9-32 will be seeded by RPI, but could be adjusted to avoid a first-round league match-up.
3. The 8 league champions will automatically qualify to the 32-team regional bracket. The remaining teams will be determined by RPI, including Ponderosa and Vista Ridge. The eight regional hosts will be determined by RPI ranking among the league champions. Teams 9-32 will be seeded under the process outlined in "Seeding Process – Class 3A, 4A, 5A," found on page 7 in this report.

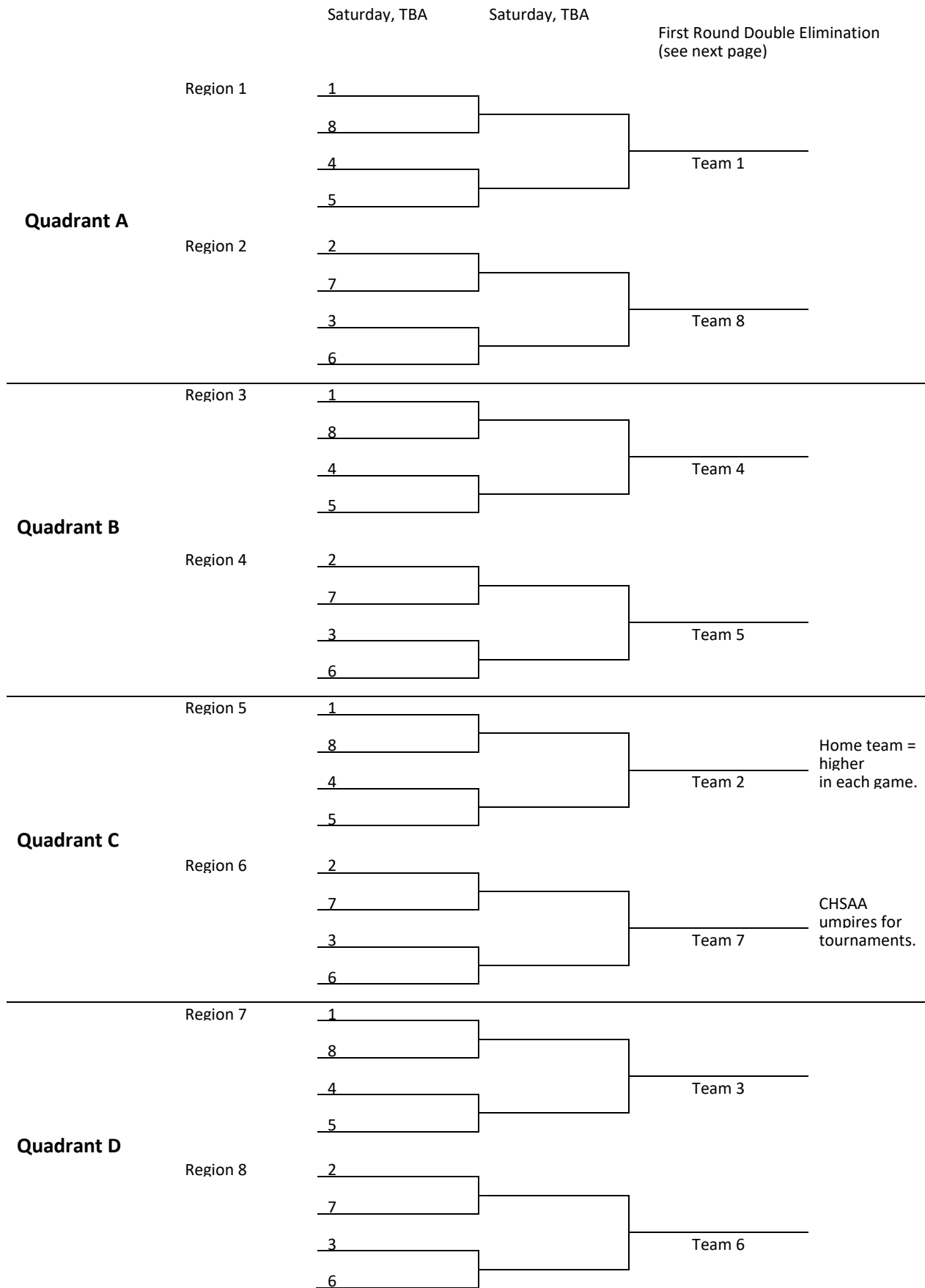

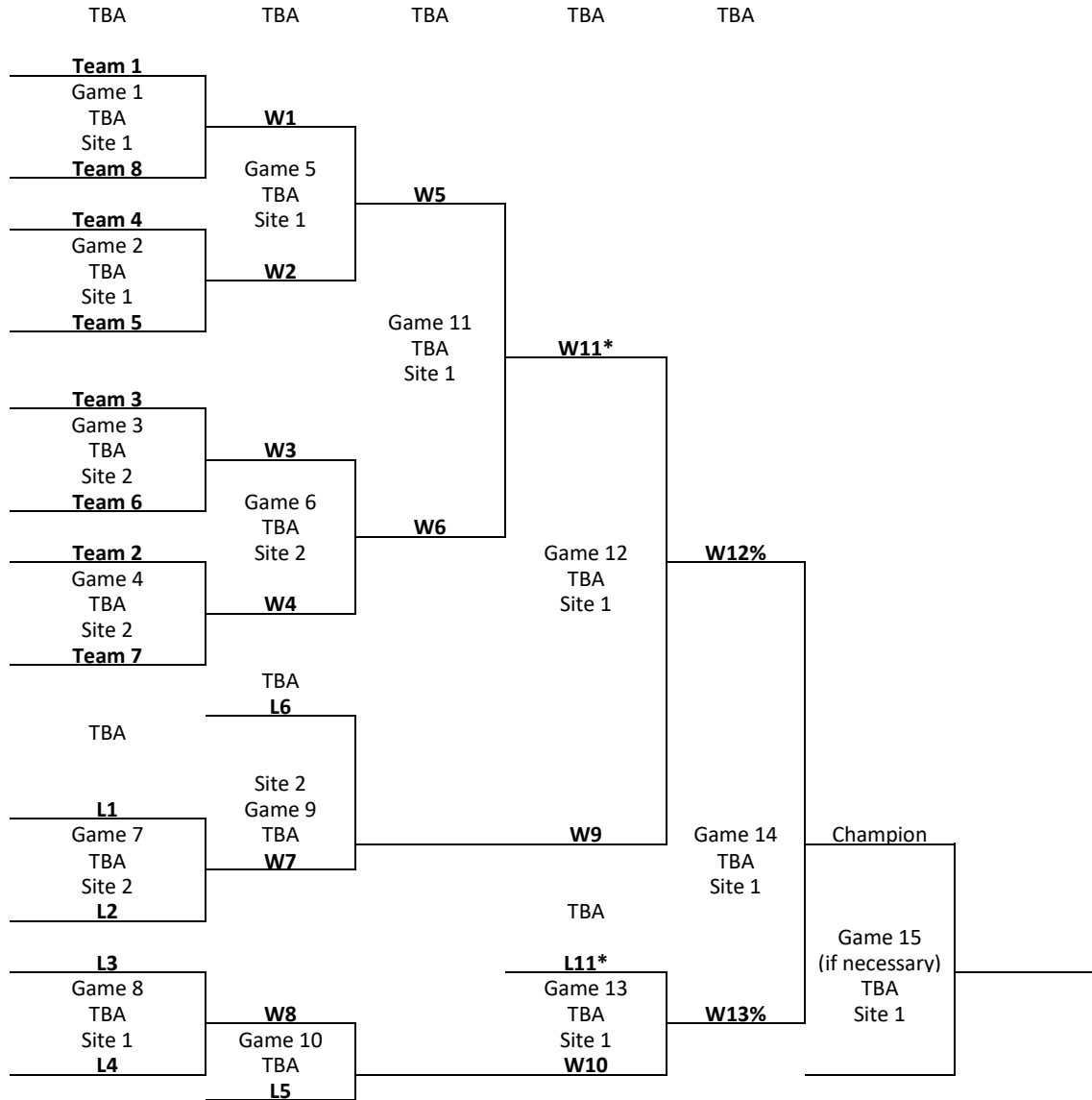

% - If three teams remain after game 13, the winner of game 11 draws a bye to game 15. If W11 loses game 12, there will be three teams left and W11 earns the bye. W12 then plays W13 to reach finals.

VI. POLICIES (ALL CLASSES)

A. Tie-Breaking System

Two-Way Tie

1. Head-to-head record in regular season.
2. If still tied, the records of the tied teams will be compared with first place team, then the second place team, etc. until the tie is broken. All higher placed ties must be broken before any lower placed ties.
3. If still tied, the following cumulative point system will be used. The team with the most points will receive the highest seed, etc. The winner of a game will receive three (3) points plus one point for each point difference in score up to five (5) (maximum of 8).
4. If still tied, a coin flip will determine the seeding. A coin flip will be used only as a last resort. If a coin flip has to be used to break a higher place tie, then the method explained in 1b above will be used to break any lower placed ties.

Three or More Way Tie

1. The head-to-head record of all teams involved in the tie will be compared to determine the seeding of all teams in the tie. If this produces a two-way tie, then the method explained in 1a above will be used; if this produces a three-way tie, then the method explained in 1b above will be used to break the tie.
2. Once a three-way tie is broken, the two remaining teams will resolve their tie as if a two-way tie exists.
3. If still tied, the following cumulative point system will be used. The team with the highest number of points will receive the highest seed. The winner of a game will receive three (3) points plus one point for each run difference in score up to five (5) (maximum of 8).
4. If still tied, a coin flip (as described in 1d above) will be used to break the tie.

B. State Association Adoptions

1. District/Regional/State Game-ending Procedures

All regional and state level games will be played to their conclusion in seven innings unless the 10-run rule comes into effect or extra innings are needed. All suspended games at the district, regional and state level shall be completed from the point of suspension to the conclusion of the contest at the earliest time possible.

All games will play seven innings unless otherwise terminated by the 10-run rule or the game goes into extra innings. NOTE: In all cases, the pitches pitched by the pitcher(s) count toward the maximum number of pitches allowed.

2. Regular Season Game-ending Procedures

A statewide game-ending procedure will be used as follows: "any game which is terminated by darkness, rain or other cause before it is a regulation game will be considered a suspended game and shall continue from that point of suspension at the earliest time possible. However, any remaining play may be shortened or terminated by mutual agreement of the opposing coaches." (Rule 4, Section 2, Article 4).

3. Speed Up Rules

The Association has adopted the use of speed up rules as noted in the NFHS Rule Book.

5. Sub-Varsity Game Time Limits

The CHSAA Baseball Committee has adopted an optional time limit for sub-varsity games at 2:15. This is a statewide standard and each league that elects to have time limits on sub-varsity contests, it must be 2:15 without variance.

C. Ratings Percentage Index

1. The Ratings Percentage Index shall be determined in the following manner:

35% of your teams winning percentage + 35% of your Opponents Winning Percentage + 30% of your opponents' opponents' winning percentage

In the event that two teams have the same RPI in the final standings, the following tiebreakers shall be used (in order). Once the tie is broken, the teams will be placed in that order.

1. Head-to-head competition
2. Winning percentage
3. Opponents' winning percentage
4. Opponents' opponents' winning percentage
5. Highest-rated win against a team in the final RPI standings
6. Next-highest rated win until the tie is broken
7. Coin flip

The RPI will continue to populate data through districts for Class 1A and 2A. For 3A, 4A, 5A the RPI will continue to populate until the final day of allowable competition Tuesday, May 9 at 9:00 pm.

D. District/League Pairing and Seeding Procedures (1A, 2A, & 3A)

1. Districts must decide their seeding procedures on or before March 10, 2017, and must submit them to the CHSAA office. Teams will be seeded by the districts tournament seeding committees.
2. In 1A and 2A if there is one outside team in the tournament and if there is not unanimous agreement by all participants in the district regarding how this team is to be seeded, the outside team will be placed on the bracket in the #3 or #6 seed according to their league winning percentage, overall record, and/or head-to-head competition within teams in the district. The team with the higher overall winning percentage will be entitled to host games if their respective seed is a designated host.
3. In 1A, all the teams in the respective district will meet and decide upon a seeding method for their district tournament and the host site(s) for the tournament. In 1A no team may be protected in a 1A district tournament for advancement.
4. In 1A and 2A, if there are two outside teams in the tournament and if there is not unanimous agreement by all participants in the district regarding how these teams are to be seeded, the outside teams will be placed on opposite sides of the bracket with one team seeded #3 or #6, and the other team seeded #4 or #5 according to league winning percentage, overall records, and/or head-to-head competition. The higher seed of the two outside teams shall be seeded in the bottom part of the bracket (2/7-3/6). Teams

with the highest overall winning percentage will be entitled to host games if their respective seed is a designated host.

5. In 1A and 2A, if there are three outside teams and if there is not unanimous agreement by all participants in the district regarding how these teams are to be seeded, two will be placed on one side of the bracket and one on the other according to league winning percentage, overall records, head-to-head competition, league finishes, etc. Schools from the same league should not play each other in the first round of the tournament unless absolutely necessary. Exceptions might be if one of the teams is 18-0 and the other is 0-18 and they are seeded #1 and #8. Teams with the higher overall winning percentage will be entitled to host games if their respective seed is a designated host.
6. In 2A, multi-league districts in preliminary rounds when home sites are used and two teams from different leagues play, the team with the higher winning percentage will be the host team.

VII. PITCHING LIMITS (Effective 2016)

A pitcher may throw up to 60 pitches over two days (i.e., 30 on Day 1 and 30 on Day 2), but will be required to have one day of required rest, due to the multiple warm-ups required for each appearance. No sub-varsity pitcher can throw more than 60 pitches over two days. That limit will result in two days of mandated rest. (Note: Swing players who play multiple days at multiple levels should combine pitches thrown and use the VARSITY chart for mandated rest.)

A pitcher will be allowed to finish a batter if they hit the limit (110 in varsity play; 85 in sub-varsity) during an at-bat, but must exit the game after the hitter.

It is strongly recommended that once a pitcher is removed, consideration be given to what position he is assigned once he is done pitching. Consideration should be given to the throwing requirement of the fielding position once the pitcher vacates the mound.

The Baseball committee strongly endorses that each school establish a pitching philosophy that includes the instruction in proper throwing mechanics, broadening the number of players who will become pitchers on their staffs, and developing a “work up” plan so that a pitcher is not throwing the maximum allowable pitches from the first day of competition (i.e., no more than 75 pitches in weeks 1-3, no more than 95 in weeks 4-6 to allow for growth and arm strength to develop, or other appropriate approach to arm safety.)

VIII. INFORMATIONAL ITEMS

1. The CHSAA shall continue its pitch count accountability process and distribute to schools prior to the start of practice.
2. All levels of teams are required to implement pitch counts and share the number of pitches each pitcher throws with the other team at the end of the game, along with posting that information on MaxPreps with 24 hours of the game.
3. The CHSAA and Colorado High School Baseball Umpires Association will make a determination, based on the number of umpires available for post-season, whether there will be two umpires or three on each regional game. There will be three umpires on each game starting with each classification's state bracket.
4. The committee voted unanimously to support, philosophically, additional games for 3A, 4A, & 5A schools.
